This opportunity was made possible through collaboration with Cornell Outdoor Education and the support of a grant from Cornell University.

The program presented a challenge for students to push themselves outside of their comfort zone and away from the familiar faces at school. Students had to develop a relationship of trust with the instructors and the belayers in order to succeed.

"The climbing wall allowed the students to try a new skill that was out of their comfort zone," said Career Skills Teacher Brandy Nielson. "By trying this new skill, students gained confidence and practiced problem solving."

Trial iPads Provide Accessibility to Assistive Technology

Thanks to a generous grant from the Triad Foundation, TST BOCES can now offer component districts a helpful new technology resource.

The \$5,000 grant provided five trial iPads, which are each equipped with three robust and well-regarded communication apps designed to help give non-verbal students a voice. The iPads can be used to help determine which application will provide the best benefit to the student before committing to one option.

"What this trial iPad does is give the speech therapist, or the classroom teacher, a chance to try several different options and pick the one that is working for the child, instead of trying to guess which one might," said Trish Peterson, a speech therapy consultant at TST BOCES.

The three apps currently being offered are Proloquo2go, CoughDrop and LAMP (Language Acquisition Motor Planning). Each of these programs are trusted communication options, but have different features that could prove beneficial to particular situations or individual student needs. The iPads are available to districts for six-week trial periods upon request.

CDOS Working to Help Students Meet Employment Success

The first entry-level, part-time and summer Youth Job Fair on May 2 was a huge success! Feedback from participants was very positive, and all employers who attended are interested in hosting a variety of work-based learning experiences for TST students. TST BOCES and members of the Tompkins County Youth Employment Resource Team co-sponsored this event and look forward to offering this and other collaborations as we continue our mission to align and enhance programs that provide youth employment, youth development and career development opportunities to all students.

Prior to attending the Youth Job Fair, a very motivated group of Groton High School students signed up for two Career Boot Camps. These lunchtime presentations, facilitated by Work-Based Learning Coordinators Michelle Pronti and Deb Demers, covered the do's and don'ts of filling out job applications and improving interview skills. "We really enjoyed working with this amazing group of students, and we are continuing our partnership with Groton by working with Assistant Principal, Billie Downs, to offer a more advanced summer workshop to Groton students," said Demers.

Teaming up with Tompkins Trust Financial and Work Force NY, Demers and Pronti are program for students to practice their job application and interview skills with Human Resource professionals from local businesses.

"Our plan is to have employers create a typical job opening and application link that will be housed on 'The Amazing Job Quest' tab of the TST Exceptional Education web page," said Demers. "Students will select a position of interest and apply. Employers will screen the student application and provide feedback as to whether or not based on their application, they would be selected to interview."

Phase two of the program will be an opportunity to interview, either in person or by telephone and again, students will receive feedback.

Phase three will be a final debriefing session with the student to discuss what they learned from the process and what they can do differently in the future. The idea for this program came from Stacie Mastin, Work Force Readiness Representative from SHRMTC (Society for Human Resource Management of Tompkins County) and HR Manager at Tompkins Trust Company.

"Stacie has been instrumental in helping us pilot this program with a small group of students and we look forward to ironing out the details and involving more companies and students next year," said Pronti.
